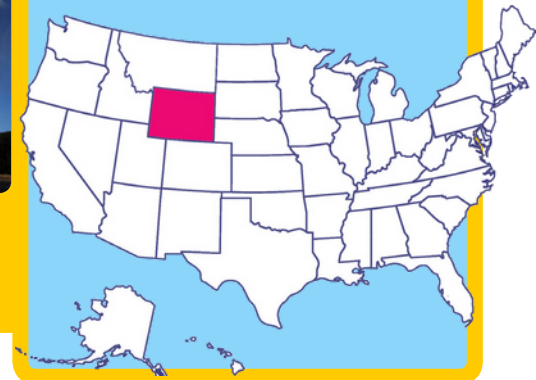

### 4. Bighorn Canyon

Become a Junior Ranger! Tour a historic ranch or paddle a boat in Bighorn Lake. Take in the view from Devil Canyon Overlook then hike Sullivan's Knob and see if you can make a triple echo!



### 5. Sinks Canyon State Park

Become a State Junior Ranger and hike the Sinks to Rise Trail. View the Popo Agie Falls or go fishing. View the Sinks and look for bighorn sheep.



### 6. Lake Guernsey State Park

Explore the the Guernsey Museum and the Castle built by the Civilian Conservation Corps, then hike the Samarez Nature Trail. Go to Register Cliff to see the names of people who travelled the Oregon Trail and visit the Oregon Trail Ruts.



### 7. Trail End State Historic Site

Picnic in the shade of the apple orchard and visit the sunken rose garden, then explore the Kendrick mansion. Enjoy the view of the Bighorn Mountains!

### 1. Yellowstone National Park

Visit Upper Geyser Basin and see Old Faithful. See the waterfalls at Canyon, then picnic at Dunraven Pass. Visit the terraces at Mammoth Hot Springs or bike the Bunsen Peak Trail. Picnic in Hayden Vally and watch for bears and bison. End the day camping in the Pebble Creek Campground.

### 2. Grand Teton National Park

Tour the visitor center at Colter Bay, then hike the Jenny Lake Trail. Canoe and try to spot bald eagles and moose. In the summer go for a swim in Jackson Lake and camp right by the water.

### 3. Devils Tower National Monument

Become a Junior Ranger! Tour the visitor center then hike the Tower Trail. Picnic near the Circle of Sacred Smoke Sculpture then sleep under the stars at Belle Fourche River Campground.
